1 Candidates will apply to CMT posts via regional deaneries/units of application. Information on specific post locations/rotations will be available on deanery websites. Eligible candidates will be given the opportunity to specify their programme preferences during the recruitment process.

4 Candidates are only required to demonstrate their eligibility for GMC registration & licensing at time of application; but must be both fully registered with and licensed by the GMC before the start date of the CMT post – ie before 1 August 2012

5 With the CMT programme being of two years' length, the full MRCP(UK) diploma will be gained within two years of taking up a CMT post

From Friday 25 November 2011, applications will be invited for vacancies in core medical training (CT1) programmes with start dates of 1 August 2012, across all deaneries in England, Northern Ireland and Wales.

All applications will be received and managed via the online application system, which can be accessed via the CT1 recruitment website (www.ct1recruitment.org) from 09:00 (UK time) on Friday 25 November 2011; all applications must be submitted by 13:00 (UK time) on Tuesday 13 December 2011.

The recruitment process for CT1 CMT is combined with CT1 ACCS (acute medicine), this means that one application and interview covers both specialties. Candidates will be given the opportunity to sub-preference the programmes they want before interview. They can choose to sub-preference any combination of programmes from the two specialties. Candidates will only receive a maximum of one interview (and offer) based on their ranking and sub-preferences.

NB – candidates can receive 'reasonable' assistance with expenses incurred in travelling to CT1 interviews, via the deanery at which their interview is held.

In April 2012 the UK Border Agency will close the Tier 1 (Post Study Work) immigration route. This route has previously been used by non-UK and non-EEA doctors who have graduated from a UK medical or dental school and have successfully completed their Foundation Programme.

The following advice on when to apply for specialty training will therefore apply for doctors applying for entry to programmes starting after 1 April 2012:

You are eligible to be considered for specialty training in both round 1 and round 2 if:

- You are a UK or EEA national.
- You are a non-UK or non-EEA national and your immigration status allows you to work without restriction in the UK. For example, if you have Tier 1 or dependant status, and no restriction against working as a doctor or dentist in training.
- You are a non-UK or non-EEA national, you graduated from a UK medical or dental school, your immigration status currently entitles you to work in the foundation programme, and where you would have previously been eligible for Tier 1 (PSW). You will need to apply for Tier 2 sponsorship, but you will be exempt from the Resident Labour Market Test (RLMT) in this instance.

You are eligible to apply for core and specialty training in round 2 if:

- You are a non-UK or non-EEA national who has limited leave to remain in the UK, and you do not fall into one of the above categories. You will require Tier 2 sponsorship and will be subject to the RLMT.

Applicants who are subject to the RLMT may only be considered if there is no suitable UK or EEA national candidate for the post. As the RLMT will not have been satisfied in round 1 of recruitment to specialty training, you should consider applying during round 2 if the RLMT applies to you.

Evidence of immigration status should normally consist of a biometric residence card, date stamped passport, and accompanying letter from the Home Office. Please visit <http://www.ukba.homeoffice.gov.uk> for more information.

CRB Check

This post is considered a 'regulated activity' within the terms of the Safeguarding Vulnerable Groups Act 2006, and appointments made after 26 July 2010 will be subject to registration with the Independent Safeguarding Authority (ISA). As such, it will be necessary for a submission for disclosure to be made to the Criminal Records Bureau to check for any previous criminal convictions.

Please note – the registration element of the Vetting and Barring Scheme (VBS) has been halted as part of the coalition government's VBS review. There is no longer a requirement for those working or volunteering with vulnerable groups to register with the ISA.
